Accomplishments

- FBI: The relationship with the FBI's Louisville Office is now a year old. Our association with the Covington office includes Ashland KSP and Maysville PD to fortify efforts. The Safe Streets Task Force mission is to identify career criminals towards violence against persons and major crimes against society and bring them to Federal Court. Federal charges/court have more strict incarceration times and penalties. The 2 officers assigned to the Safe Streets Task Force produced: 20 criminal investigations initiated under Federal court action producing 14 guilty by pleas or trials.
- FBI WV Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force and KSP Task Force: APD
 participated in numerous events involving undercover operations and other internet
 surveillance activities.
- Partnership with US Secret Service and the KY Attorney General Office: 2 cases
 resulted in minors and computer activity like ICAC investigations. This new task force is
 less than 6 months old and will continue to increase. APD's participation also allowed
 APD to receive more than \$60K worth of computer equipment, software and training at
 no expense to CoA.
- Appalachian High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (AHIDTA): Continued operations with the Northeast Kentucky Drug Task Force of Boyd County, with APD as the lead agency, along with KSP, Boyd County Sheriff, and Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms and the FBI. The main goal is to interrupt the drug trafficking organizations in our area, different than that of street level activity that field officers and detectives still investigate. CY 2022 statistics show an increase in Methamphetamine and decrease in Fentanyl. A broader choice of *narcotics along with guns continue to be on the rise. See statistics below:
 - Methamphetamine: 1,670.50 Grams 3.7 Pounds (2.7 pounds 2021)
 - Fentanyl: 421.95 Grams Pounds (5.08 pounds 2021)
 - Cash Seized/Recovered: \$55,012.61
 - Property Seized/Recovered: \$47,995
 - o Arrests: 29 (49 in 2021)
 - Guns Seized/Recovered: 7 (29 in 2021)
 - *Totals do not include pounds marijuana, cocaine, prescription pills*
 - o 16 Persons convicted in Federal Court
 - 17 Persons convicted in State Court
 - Many investigations are ongoing with indictments and warrants to be obtained.

- Double homicide resulted in the suspect being identified, arrested and awaiting trial.
- Community Policing:
 - No Shave November raised \$1,080 for Cancer Awareness; donations supported Ashland Community Hospice.
 - Many accolades published in the Daily Independent and on Facebook for positive actions by APD's Officers.
 - COVID-19: The pandemic still presented challenges in the early portion of 2021 as officers continued to interact with the criminal element and put themselves in harm's way of contracting COVID daily, even today.



- National Night Out: Held again in Central Park. Community groups, music
 & games for kids were available along with officers on site to talk with.
- ABC Responsibilities: APD continued responsibility of Alcohol Administration and Enforcement and continued building relationships with businesses in order to work together to solve & prevent problems. The Boyd County wet designation provides additional responsibilities regarding new types of licenses.
 - Renewal/approved 46 current licenses
 - Processed/approved 19 temporary licenses
 - Collected/processed regulatory fees/payments
- Crime Scene Efforts: APD continues to identify technology, training, and strategies to adapt to 21st Century Policing directed by the Federal Government.
- Officer Troy Patrick was named 2022 D.A.R.E. Officer of the Year for Kentucky!!
- Accreditation: APD was re-accredited for the 4th time by the Kentucky Association of Chiefs of Police; APD has been accredited since 2009.
- Monitored demonstrations, walks & marches due to social injustice issues. APD worked with group leaders & individuals to make these events safe and to get their message heard under the 1st Amendment which took a coordinated joint and interagency effort.
- Regional law enforcement partner/leader: On June 30, 2022, APD deployed officers to Floyd County, Kentucky in response to an active shooter. 3 of their police officers were killed along with a police K-9. APD officers aided in manpower, evidence preservation



and critical crisis incident support to not only to Floyd County officers, but also to KSP. The suspect subsequently surrendered and was taken into custody. The K-9 that was killed was initial handler by one APD's recent hires. APD allowed the officer to assist the Floyd County Sheriff in handling funeral services for the K-9. Additionally, Chief Kelley had started mentoring Assistant Chief Russ Shurtleff of Prestonsburg since a previous training session. APD Officers attended all funerals in support of officers, their families, and departments. APD also provided a

mutual aid request for more than 72 hours for the community to ensure they felt safe during the mourning period. This was all a first for APD. APD answered over 30

criminal calls in that community and talked and attempted to help heal the community. APD's Facebook page was nearly endless with thanks.

- Take Home Fleet: Entering its third year, the take home fleet program (started with a purchase of 19 vehicles in 2019) has produced the results we anticipated:
 - Increased omni-presence across the city, especially during shift changes as officer's equipment is already in the vehicle; shift changes are shorter.
 - Officers take more pride in maintaining "their" vehicle.
 - Reduced mileage allows the new vehicles to remain under warranty as opposed to ""mileaging""-out" as happened in the recent past.

 Winchester Avenue Street Improvements and Streetscaping Project In-Progress: ICW engineering contractor firm, KYTC, KYOVA and CoA staff, completed a Transportation Feasibility Study and concept plan to convert Wincher Avenue to 2 lane traffic with angled parking between 13th Street & 18th Street. 


